### To the Point

Welcome back to *The Point* as we resume our strange new journey through a virtual and viral fall at the Universalist Unitarian Church of Waterville!

I've been thinking a lot about this virus and about the frustrations of the kindly Dr. Fauci with the self-centeredness of so many Americans. He has said that if only 18-year-olds on Florida beaches could understand and feel they have a deep responsibility for the life of an 80-year-old man in Chicago or that the unmasked man declaring his political freedom in a Waterville store felt that same responsibility for an immunity-compromised infant in Harlem, then the handful of common-sense public health guidelines of masking, distancing, foregoing large gatherings, etc., would bring the virus down to controllable levels in fairly short order and hasten the successful opening of the economy for everybody. But such is not the case across this nation.

This brings back memories of a story-lesson of 2,700 years ago written in the Torah's Book of Genesis. The story of Cain and Abel: Cain, jealous of his brother Abel's more acceptable burnt offerings, kills him and runs away. When asked by the spirit of God (in modern parlance, by "his conscience"), "Where is your brother?", Cain answers, "How should I know? Am I my brother's keeper?" 2,700 years! ### **Interfaith Council**

The Interfaith Council meets once per month and represents faith-based organizations as well as Colby College and Thomas College. It is open to all.

At the July meeting, held by Zoom, Rev. Mark Wilson, of the UCC Church on Eustis Parkway announced it had sold its building and is now leasing space on the lower level of The Elms (next to the Post Office). Rev. Wilson will be leaving his position in mid-September. He was hired specifically as an interim minister to help the church sell its building and find a new location. The Interfaith Council will say its goodbyes and well wishes in person at The Elms during the September meeting.

Most of our meetings center on two areas - the extreme lack of affordable housing and the creative way churches and schools are meeting with their congregations and students.

During the pandemic, the Waterville Homeless Shelter has been full and has experienced no outbreaks of COVID-19. Families are housed in area motels and provided three meals per day. Many folks have housing vouchers for apartments but end up waiting many weeks before obtaining housing.

The Methodist Church is currently holding "lawn chair" services once per month and uses Zoom the other weeks.

The Episcopal Church has two services - an outdoor service at 9 a.m. and a Zoom service at 10:30 a.m. I shared our wonderful experiences with Zoom services and coffee hours as well as outdoor group meetings in Fort Halifax Park. Sue Morrill

### **Tuesday Discussion Group**

Check-in time is brief; the purpose of this time is for sharing, and the group time is not to be used as a therapy session. Members attempt to stay on topic and give others time to speak by taking turns and keeping comments reasonably brief while still completing their thoughts. Members try to be aware of individual differences; for example, speaking loudly enough for all to hear. ### Water Communion Ceremony: Sunday September 13

The Water Communion Ceremony was first used at a Unitarian Universalist worship service in the 1980s. Many UU congregations now hold a Water Communion once a year, often at the beginning of the new church year.

Traditionally members bring to the service a small amount of water from a place that is special to them. During the appointed time in the service, people one by one pour their water together into a large bowl. As the water is added, the person who brought it tells why this water is special to them. The combined water is symbolic of our shared faith coming from many different sources. It is often then blessed by the congregation, and sometimes is later boiled and used as the congregation's "holy water" in child dedication ceremonies and similar events. Unfortunately, given that services are virtual, we will not be able to observe this ceremony this year.
